Andy Plumley on the History of UC Riverside Part II at the Winter Luncheon

UCR retirees and emeriti gathered at the Alumni and Visitors Center for our annual Winter Luncheon on February 7. UCRRA President Andy Plumley welcomed all attendees. After calling on everyone to give generously on UCR's Give Day March 4-5, Andy introduced the most recent recipients of the UCRRA Undergraduate Scholarship. Three of this year's awardees are freshmen: Isabelle Graham, Jacob Cervantes, and Christopher Zaldivar. Citlali Campos is a sophomore. Colin Donahue, now in his junior year, received the award for a third time.



Emeriti Association Co-President Rusty Russell followed with news of the UCREA. The winner of this year's Distinguished Emeritus/a Award is Professor Emeritus of Sociology David Swanson. Swanson received the award in recognition of his high scholarly productivity as a demographer in the years since his retirement in 2018. Because he now lives in the state of Washington, Swanson was unable to attend the Winter Luncheon in person. He expressed his appreciation to the Association for the award in a brief video.

Following these UCRRA and UCREA announcements, Rusty introduced UCRRA President and Former Associate Vice Chancellor of Auxiliary Services Andy Plumley, who returned to the history of UC Riverside that he had begun at the Winter Luncheon one year before. This year's account began with the Chancellorship of Ted Hullar, who Andy credited with initiating UCR's School of Engineering. The service of Rosemary Schraer as Chancellor was tragically cut short when she passed away suddenly in 1992. Chancellor Ray Orbach was one of Andy's favorites. Over his ten years as Chancellor, Orbach doubled UCR's enrollment, added over a million square feet of floorspace, and raised our athletic program to Division I. UCR's growth slowed when Francis Cordova became Chancellor in 2002, but Andy credits Cordova with opening the Alumni and Visitor's Center, building the Highlander Union Building, and working for a medical school. Under the leadership of Tim White (2007-2013), UCR's School of Medicine was approved, the School of Public Policy was established, and campus enrollment grew from 17,187 to 21,297. Kim Wilcox has served as Chancellor since 2013. On his watch, UCR has earned high rankings for its contributions to social mobility, and campus enrollment has grown to more than 26,000 students.

Winter Events 2025

In the Winter Quarter of 2025, UCR emeriti and retirees participated in a diverse set of uniquely memorable events. On January 24, UCR emeriti and retirees were treated to a tour and guitar recital in the Music Department, followed by a visit to the Bell Tower to hear a carillon concert. At the Winter Luncheon on February 7, UCR Retirees' Association President Andy Plumley resumed his informative and entertaining history of UCR, starting with the Chancellorship of Ted Hullar. On February 11, a "Tech Tips" session on setting up smart homes attracted so much interest that it lasted an extra half hour. On March 4, Dickson Professor John Ganim showed that a great deal of "cosmopolitanism" was prevalent in the Middle Ages if we know how to recognize it when we see it.

Emeriti Association Graduate Student Travel Award

Since its inception in 2021-2022, the UCREA Graduate Student Travel Award has played an increasingly significant role in supporting graduate students who have been advanced to candidacy at UCR. For students who need to travel for research purposes or to present a paper at a professional meeting, the award pays \$1,500 for domestic travel and \$2,000 for foreign trips. By March 2025, the current use fund that supports this award had grown to over \$15,400, and \$7,595 in new funding was raised in response to UCR's Give Day campaign on March 4-5. This funding made it possible to make three travel awards in Winter 2025, one for international travel and two for domestic trips. To support future Graduate Student Travel Awards, emeriti and friends are encouraged to make gifts to the current use fund or to the endowment fund that support this award.







"Cosmopolitanism and the Middle Ages" Delivered by John Ganim



By David Glidden, Emeritus Professor of Philosophy Doyen of medieval literature, raconteur of esoterica, architecturologist extraordinaire, our own sprite octogenarian John Ganim spoke with characteristic enthusiasm of the later Middle Ages, when sages shared a wisdom without borders to confine them. We see this in their ready acquaintance with other secular languages, such as Chaucer's deep familiarity with French. Not only could literate Europeans converse with one another, but they could also communicate with non-European peoples from Arabic, Judaic, Ethiopian, Indian, Mongolian, and Chinese cultures.

To illuminate this universality of intercourse, Ganim acquainted us with the travels and travel literatures of figures from the later Middle Ages, especially after the bubonic plague had imposed its desolation and isolation in the early 14th century. As they had done in antiquity, travel writers would build up their own narratives from other such

writers, letters, chronicles and histories. And as a visual highlight of this engaging lecture, Ganim showed us Columbus' marginal notes on Columbus's own edition of Marco Polo's travelogue.

The various kingdoms of the medieval world turned out to be smaller than they seemed, less isolated, as pilgrimages, explorations, conquests and trade routes brought an emerging cosmopolitanism to Britain and Northern Europe, one that Spain, North Africa, and Middle Eastern regions had already known, thanks to earlier Islamic conquests and colonization. In this way, too, Islamic scholars and their Jewish scribes translated the heritage of ancient Greek papyri into Latin and secular languages, across the borders from Iraq into Spain, France, and beyond, sowing the seeds for the European Renaissance.

As he drew his lecture to a close, Ganim presented us with a map depicting several interlocking ovals of shared cultural familiarities. Some world travelers might find themselves confined within two or three such circles of acquaintance, but others, like Jesuits, Jews, Marco Polo, would know far more. Yet, for each of them, the world seemed much larger than it was. So, our beloved John Ganim concluded his tale with these lines from the Bard's "Tempest": Miranda: "How beauteous mankind is! O brave new world that has such people in't!", but Prospero responds: "Tis new to thee."

(In the question period, Ganim pointed out in response, that the otherness of languages and ethnicities were certainly well known in the Middle Ages, but then he was asked in turn: when did racism begin? –leaving our audience to ponder this further.)







Walks, Talks & Tours: Music Department, Lecture, and Recital

On January 24 of this year, a group of retirees and emeriti enjoyed an educational, aesthetically intriguing, and informative treat. On a lovely Friday morning, we gathered in the Music Department's Performance Space 166. Chair of the Music Department, Jonathan Ritter, welcomed us with remarks about the department's faculty and students, its mission, and its healthy growth. With Jonathan as our amiable and expert guide, our group toured classrooms, the state-of-the-art keyboard skills facility, and practice rooms, include the room that contains the practice carillon.

Returning to the Performance Space, we were delighted by music department graduate student in musicology, Jorge Calaf, who played a short recital of music for guitar. These selections featured works from the Renaissance to the twentieth century. University Carillonneur David Christensen then delivered a fascinating lecture that included the history carillons across the centuries, and then focused on the acoustic challenges of composing (or arranging) music for this unique instrument.

After this talk, we moved out to the Bell Tower at noon for a beautiful recital on our carillon played expertly by David Christensen. The program was elegantly chosen: David presented a variety of music, including compositions by Baroque composers such as Arcangelo Corelli and Johann Sebastian Bach; arrangements of three Celtic folksongs; a particularly lovely Filipino folk song; and an evocative transcription of a Beatle's tune, "Here, There, and Everywhere." One of the most remarkable aspects of this concert was the range of dynamics from subduced to magnificently robust. In other words, a good time was had by all.
